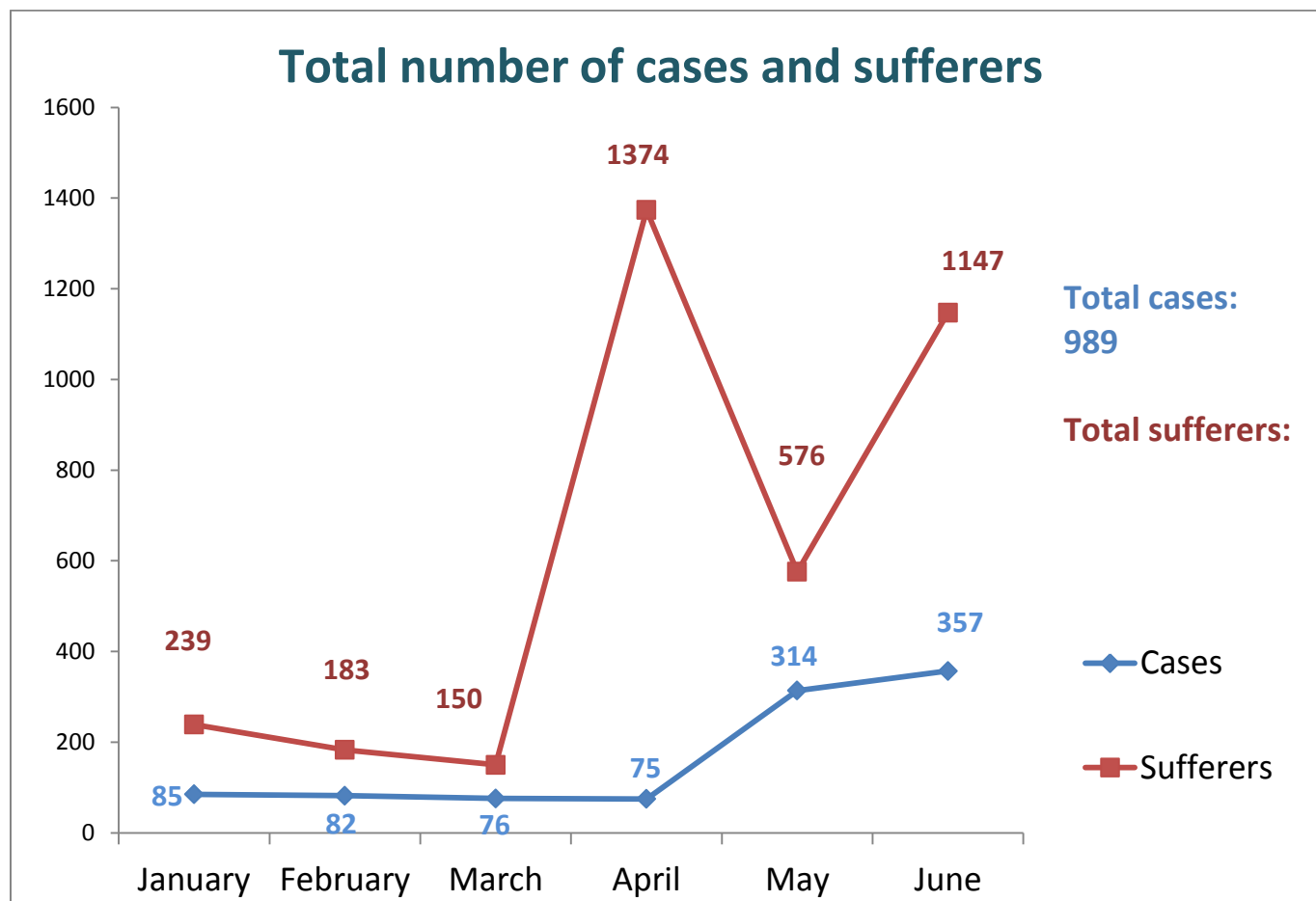
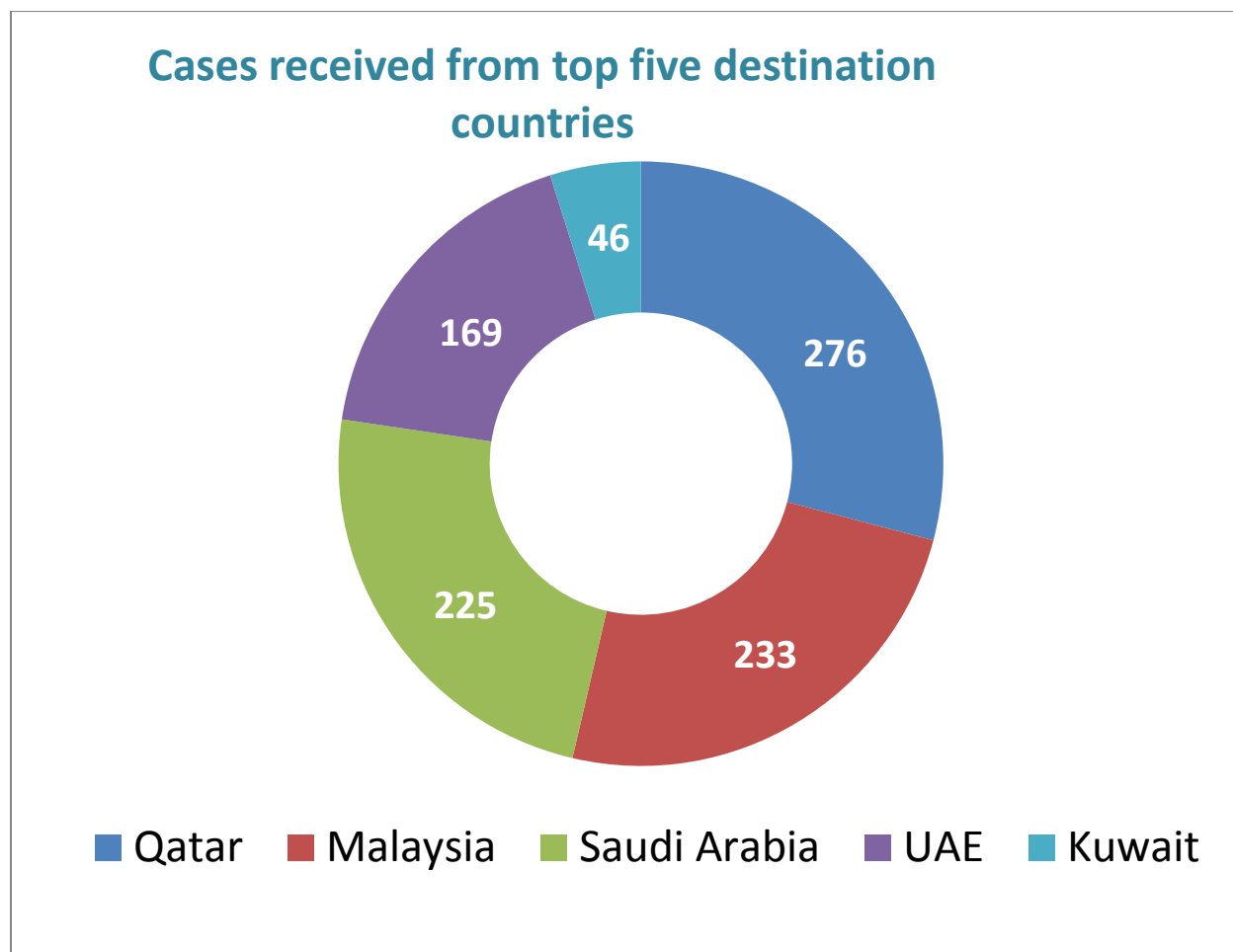


PNCC (Jan 2020-June 2020) in Graphs



PNCC's record from the beginning of 2020 till the end of June shows 3669 sufferers and 989 cases. The graph shows a huge spike during April as the number of sufferers increased massively. With the outbreak of COVID 19 in Gulf and Malaysia, people panicked to return Nepal at the earliest possible.



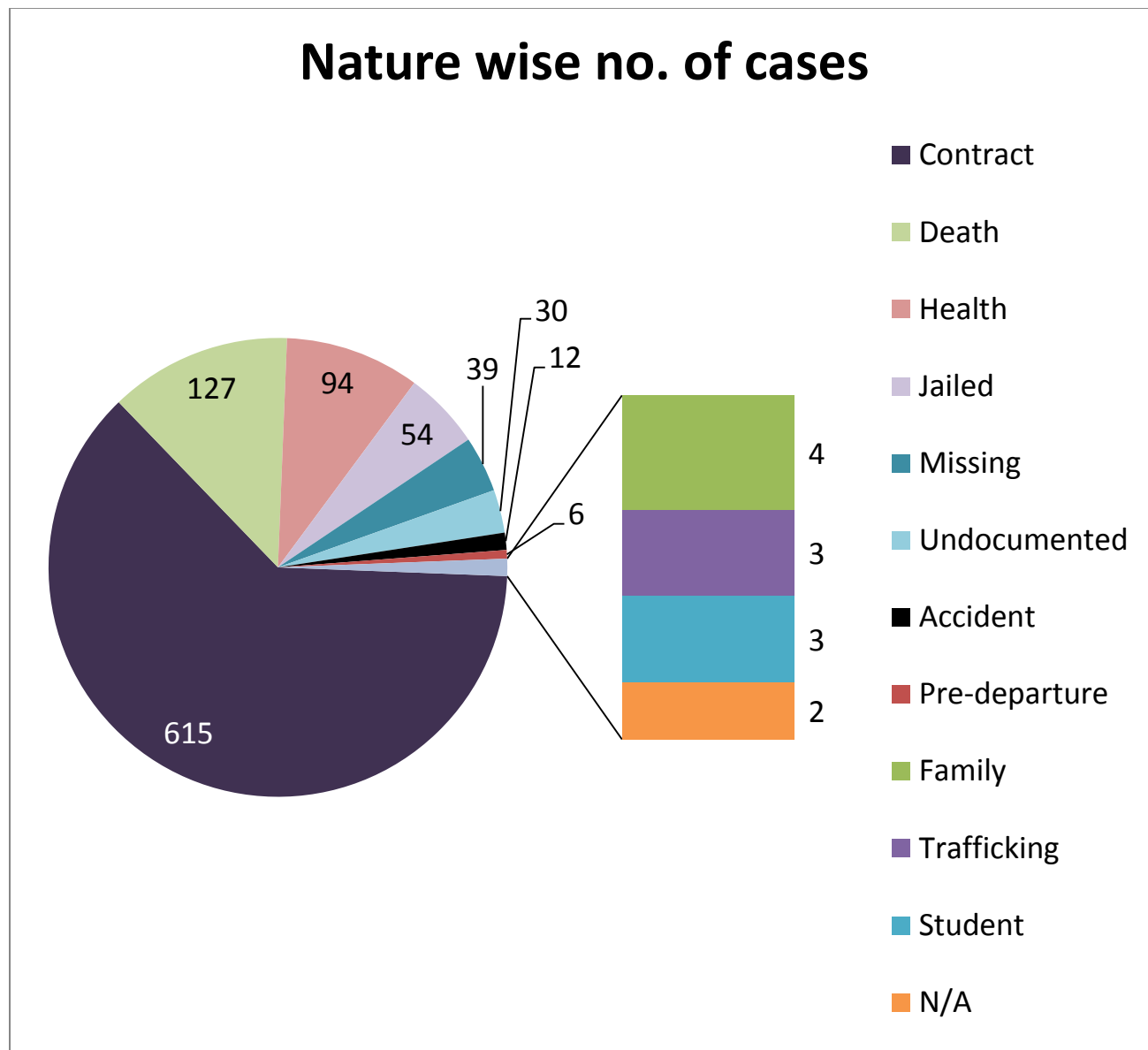

Half yearly

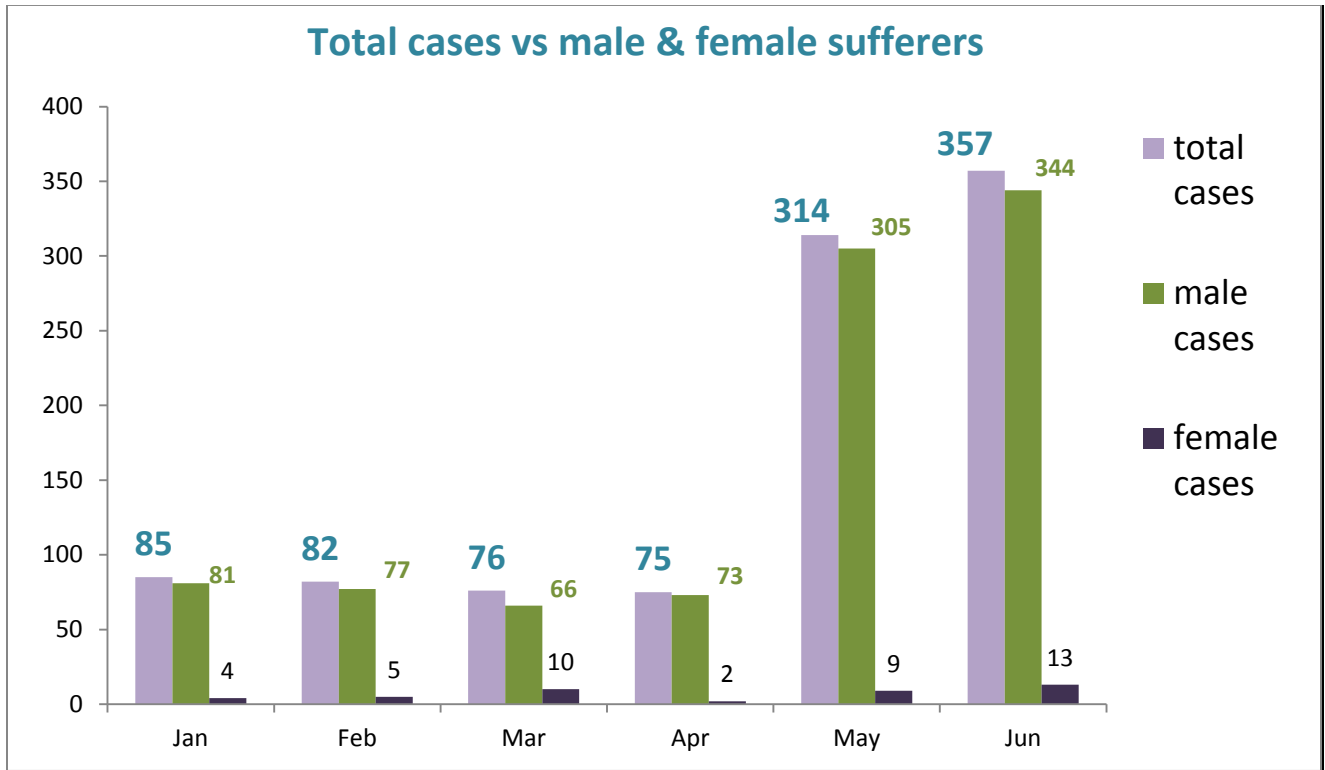

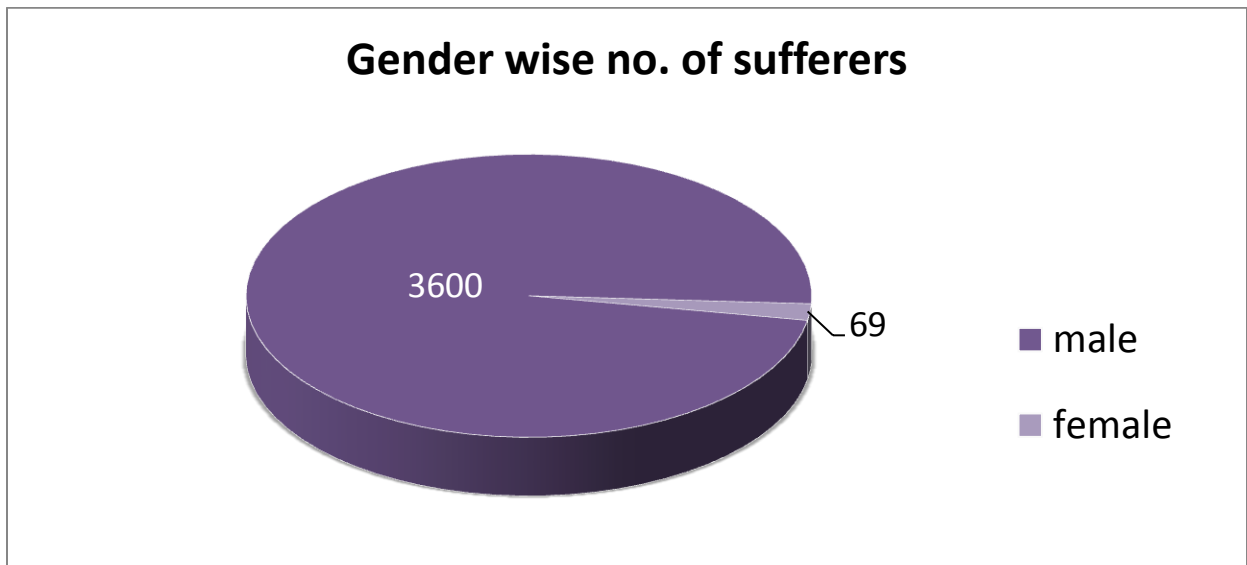


With estimated 1.3 million Nepali migrant workers in seven destination countries- Qatar, Saudi Arabia, the United Arab Emirates, Kuwait, Bahrain, Oman, and Malaysia, Nepalis lost their jobs since the pandemic hit these countries and therefore wanted to come home.

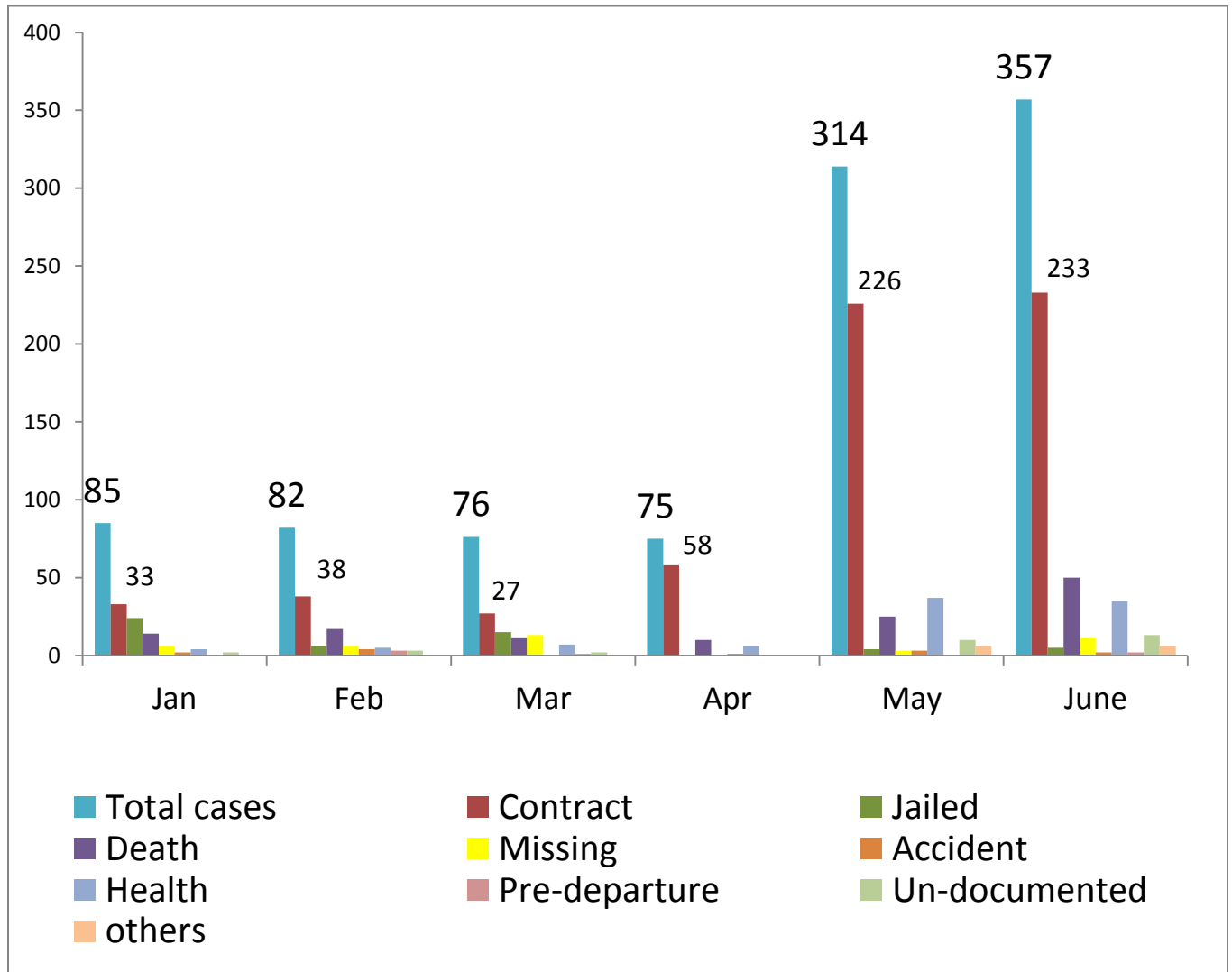
As a large number of Nepali workers lost their jobs, many were without food and money and even they could not return home because of the restrictions upon international flights.



Out of total 989 cases, male cases count 946 while female counts 43. With high number of male cases, the total number of male sufferers' counts 3600 and female sufferers' counts 69.

The above shown data shows that most of the cases received are contract cases. With the outbreak of the pandemic, the renewal of contracts were not possible hence, number of contract cases increased.
